Echo Chambers: An Analysis of Anti-Asian Narratives Through LLMs

This art installation explores the formation and persistence of Anti-Asian/Immigrant narratives, their amplification and reinforcement through media echo chambers, and their impact on real people. Using Large Language Models trained on various articles, journals, and newspaper, the installation demonstrate

how media can create narratives of "the Other." It draws parallels between the internet user and LLMs tokenizing text, contrasting the radicalization of LLMs (or internet users) with portraits of Asian hate victims. Beyond demonstrating the effects of racism, xenophobia, and bigotry, the installation aims to ignite essential conversations in today's polarized media landscape.

Racial Trauma, Diminished Racial Pride, and a Potential Role of Racial Identity

Emerging research on race-based trauma highlights the detrimental effects of repeated exposure to racial discrimination. This research has found negative psychological and physical health outcomes associated with racial trauma. My study elaborates on this research by investigating the relationship between racial trauma and racial pride, as well as the potential moderating role of racial identity. Specifically, I investigate the hypotheses that high levels of racial trauma will be correlated with diminished pride in one's own racial group, and that internalization identities will weaken this relationship, while conformity and dissonance identities are amplifying.

Decolonial Empowerment: Arabic Poetry and bell hooks' "All About Love" Explored

This project explores the transformative power of poetry in telling the stories of Middle Eastern women. By examining contemporary poets like Saniyah Saleh and Mona Kareem, it highlights how their work addresses themes such as love, anger, and struggle—topics often silenced in their communities. In societies where discussing personal emotions is taboo, poetry becomes a crucial tool for expressing complex feelings and resisting colonialist and patriarchal norms. Using bell hooks' insights from All About Love, this study examines how poetry fosters self-expression and challenges systemic injustices, offering a space for healing and empowerment for Middle Eastern women.

Weaponized Whiteness and Streamlined Intersections: Historicizing Get Out

This presentation analyzes Jordan Peele's "Get Out" and its symbolic parallels to Jim Crow, investigating race and gender constructs within the context of American history. This presentation argues that the film's cursory representation of intersectionality joins a history of hegemonic White Femininity to expose the horror of being Black in the US. In so doing, Peele alludes to W.E.B. Du Bois' double consciousness theory and Ida B. Wells' seminal essays. With attention paid to audience responses, this presentation contextualizes Peele's balance between satire, subversion, and outright horrific depictions of the uniquely American Black-White dynamic.

Considering Mental Health in Japan

This presentation examines how Japan's demanding work culture contributes to stress, depression, and high suicide rates, emphasizing the cultural stigmas that prevent individuals from seeking help. I will explore how biological differences in stress responses between Japanese and American populations may impact the effectiveness of mental health treatments, shedding light on why interventions developed in the U.S. might not be as effective in Japan. Drawing from personal stories during my time abroad, I will discuss how these experiences shaped the current direction of my SIP, which seeks to understand the intersection of culture, biology, and mental health.

Global/Local Engagement: I worked alongside IRCN at the University of Tokyo in Japan.

Bachata: Preserving Afro-Dominican Roots in a Globalized World

My SIP explores Bachata's cultural and historical significance, a vibrant music and dance style originating from the Dominican Republic, emphasizing its deep connections to the country's Black population. Tracing Bachata's evolution from the colonial era through periods of oppression to its global recognition, I hope to highlight the contributions of Afro-Dominicans to this art. As well as, examine the racial dynamics, societal challenges, and the legacy of Bachata, in hopes of fostering a deeper understanding of its roots and its role in shaping Dominican national identity.

Balancing Sustainability with Preservation in Historic Italian Architecture

Italy's rich architectural heritage presents unique challenges for implementing modern sustainability measures, as many buildings are protected by strict preservation regulations. During my internship at the sustainable architecture firm Weber Architects in Florence, I gained insight into how stakeholders approach sustainable renovations within these constraints. I plan to use the transformation project of the ex-STA.VE.CO military complex in Bologna as a case study to explore this dynamic. My project aims to examine how Italian architects and contractors balance preservation and sustainability while integrating energy-efficient technologies and complying with laws that protect cultural heritage.

The research focuses on the critical role of alternative agricultural methods, such as agroforestry, in mitigating the severe effects of climate change-induced food insecurity. By examining both quantitative and qualitative perspectives, this project will aim to provide a comprehensive understanding of how different regions in Latin America are affected by climate change and will explore potential solutions to alleviate food insecurity through sustainable agricultural practices.

Global/Local Engagement: This past summer, I worked in Cochabamba, Bolivia as a community garden assistant while researching food insecurity and sustainable agriculture.

Examining Regenerative, Biodynamic, and Organic Agricultural Methods and Principles in German Viticulture

This project is focused on regenerative agriculture practices within German viticulture among fine wine producers, specifically in the Rheinhessen wine region. By increasing biodiversity, improving the water cycle, enhancing the ecosystem, and supporting carbon sequestration, regenerative agriculture boosts soil health and resilience to climate change. Through incorporating regenerative methods such as cover cropping, vineyard managers and winemakers strive to strengthen vine resilience while improving wine

quality. The study will examine the initial adoption of regenerative methodology in viticulture, the current methods and experiences of Rheinhessen fine wine producers, and the future of the German wine industry regarding climate change.

Adaptive Strategies: Italian Conservation Approaches for Pakistani Architecture

This project is a comparative analysis of conservation techniques used in Italian and Pakistani architecture, as a mode to implement those techniques in Saraiki-Pakistani structures amidst climate change. It examines how developed nation-states like Italy are conserving their architecture that is vulnerable to damage- highlighting the role of architectural preservation in maintaining cultural visibility and the social fabric. By comparing these techniques, the project explores the visual and structural features of select heritage sites in both countries and emphasizes the need for technological, legal, and community efforts to ensure the structural viability of historical sites amidst climate change.

The 'Othering' of Labor Migrants in Japan: Japan's Hospitality Industry

As Japan's working-age population continues to age, the imperative to attract labor migrants grows; despite this impending need, migrants are still viewed as temporary and disposable labor. My research, based on fieldwork I conducted at a small boutique hotel in Kyoto, explores the experiences of labor migrants in Japan's hospitality industry. By examining how they navigate the Japanese workplace in a fast-paced hotel environment, I aim to shed light on why labor migrants choose to work in Japan despite significant obstacles such as language or cultural barriers.

Impacts of Stigma: Access to Mental Healthcare in the US and France

There are many factors that can inhibit access to mental health care or treatment, including complications with insurance and lack of information about mental health and mental health resources. These barriers are all influenced by the stigmatization of mental health. In this presentation, I will examine my experiences thus far in the US and France that show the influence stigma has in creating barriers to helpful resources. When I complete my CISLA project, I hope to expand my knowledge about the mental healthcare system in both countries and ways that we can destigmatize getting help for our mental health.

The Political Economy of Japan's Startup Ecosystem

In 2022, Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida unveiled a "new form of capitalism," aimed at boosting investment in startups. When people think of major Japanese firms, they often envision corporations like Honda and Sony. However, Kishida highlights that these giants were once startups founded by young entrepreneurs, and emphasized the necessity of cultivating such innovation in Japan today. Furthermore, the introduction of a startup visa in 2015 has made it easier for foreign entrepreneurs to establish businesses in Japan. My research will investigate the experiences of these foreign entrepreneurs and the implications for the globalization of the Japanese startup ecosystem.

Pluralism and Universalism: Comparing U.S and French Plans to Counter Antisemitism

In 2023, France and the U.S. released national plans to counter anti-Semitism. The U.S. National Strategy to Counter Antisemitism and France's Plan national de lutte contre le racisme, l'antisémitisme et les discriminations liées à l'origine reflect their distinct political frameworks: American multicultural pluralism and French Universalism. This project explores the origins of Jewish history in both nations to contextualize each plan. Through comparative analysis, it assesses how each plan reflects the political ideologies of its respective country and how this affects modern manifestations of anti-semitism.

My project investigates how, despite internal and external struggles, they rise above obstacles to follow their career dreams.

Police Abuse of Refugee Women and Children in Northern France

This presentation examines how women and children face abuse from the French National Police at the EU border in Calais, France. As people continue to die during the treacherous journey crossing the

English Channel, I hope to better understand the history of the Calais "Jungle" and the role of police abuse on the refugee communities, and the heightened dangers posed towards women and children surviving these conditions. As a humanitarian aid volunteer, I am deeply interested in exploring the legal measures taken to make our jobs as difficult as possible.

Global/Local Engagement: For two months, I worked at the Refugee Women's Center in Calais, France, providing humanitarian assistance to female refugees.

The Effects of Post-Dictatorship Politics on Argentina's Legalization of Abortion

My project focuses on the trajectory of the legalization of abortion in Argentina. The pro-abortion movement in Argentina is distinctive from other similar movements because of the challenges it has faced from the effects of its last military Dictatorship and the current political influence of the Catholic Church. In order to improve maternal health and safety, pro-abortion activists in Argentina have fought to see through multiple successes, including the federal law that legalized abortion in 2020. This research underscores the significance of Argentina's fight to legalize abortion and how activists are maintaining the movement to this day.

Has Spain Recovered from the European Financial Crisis of 2008-2009?

The Financial Crisis of 2008-2009 was a worldwide event that affected every country. Spain was no different as their housing bubble popped and loans defaulted. Pedro Sanchez and the current government believe the crisis is over. Undocumented Immigrant Families: Sacrifice, Separation, and Well-Being

According to Pew Research Center, there are currently over 11 million undocumented immigrants in the United States. Examining this topic allows us to understand how sacrifice and separation contribute to generational trauma and enables us to offer socio-emotional support to those impacted, especially in a community where mental health is very stigmatized.

Non State Actors Negotiate: Comparing Israeli-Palestinian & Moroccan-Western Saharan Ceasefire Proposals

This comparative study examines the leverage of nonstate actors in negotiations, using recent Israeli-Palestinian ceasefire proposals and the Moroccan-Western Saharan peace treaty as case studies. By incorporating GIS analysis (similarly to artists Miki Kratsman & Shabtai Pinchevsky) I plan to analyze how buffer zones and settlement expansion create geographic and demographic pressures, shaping nonstate actors' leverage in negotiations. Special focus is placed on third-party diplomatic efforts to secure lasting agreements in asymmetric conflicts. Insights gained from an internship at the German embassy in Rabat provide a practical understanding of the diplomatic tools available in these peace processes.

What Makes a Tourist Location? Analyzing Tourist Locations Through Japan

COVID-19 prohibited travel in countries for over two years, leading to one of the greatest upticks in travel around the world. In Japan, the number of tourists has increased exponentially each year since. As tourism becomes more prevalent, I plan to investigate how tourist locations are created in intentional and unintentional ways and the effects of tourism on locations in Japan and my home communities.

Comparative Analysis of Gut Microbiota and Dietary Impact Between USA and Brazil

This research highlights how regional dietary patterns contribute to variations in microbiota composition. Dietary patterns differ around the world due to food regulations, cultural practices, and climate composition. Different gut microbial compositions have Implications for Health and could explain public health patterns in certain areas. The western American diet is known for their refined carbohydrates and added sugars associated with reduced microbial diversity and poorer gut health while the Brazilian diet is higher intake of fruits, vegetables, and legumes. These differences may explain regional variations in health outcomes, which plays a pivotal role in metabolic disorders and immune function.

Global/Local Engagement: During the summer of 2024 I had an internship in Lisbon at the Institute of Medicina Molecular.

Campesino Communities: Social Collaboration as a Means Towards Regional Food Sovereignty

I have spent the past two summers working on small-scale commercial farms. During the school year, I regularly volunteer at FRESH New London. Combined, these experiences were a way for me to deepen my understanding of food systems and explore how they are related to social justice. In Mexico, I had the opportunity to expand my awareness of these topics by working with campesinos (small farmers) and

getting to know their history and culture. The result was a question: what role does systematic collaboration between members of a community play in the formation of regional food sovereignty?

Travel: A Catalyst for Creativity, Connection, and Reflection of Life Priorities

Given the species' critical ecological role and its declining population, understanding these perspectives is essential. By examining how these views correlate with conservation attitudes, the study aims to identify barriers and opportunities for effective conservation strategies, ultimately contributing to the protection and preservation of horseshoe crabs in the Long Island Sound.

Eelgrass Restoration in Long Island Sound

Eelgrass meadows in the Long Island Sound have been declining due to increased anthropogenic effects, such as intensification of storms and recreational boating. Understanding and Evaluating Collaborative Healthcare for Substance Use Disorder

Individuals with Substance Use Disorders (SUD) are clinically underserved due to increased health and psychiatric comorbidities, structural barriers to treatment, stigma, and insufficient resources, highlighting a need for collaborative, accessible, and culturally-competent treatment. Brigham and Women's Hospital's Bridge Clinic (BWH BC) is a multi-disciplinary SUD treatment, collaborative healthcare that transitions patients to longer-term care. Using semi-structured interviews to explore patient and provider experiences toward the BWH BC model, this study evaluates patient and provider experiences to further optimize SUD treatment. A thematic analysis is being conducted to elucidate main themes and insight.

Global/Local Engagement: NIDA Summer Internship Program, Suzuki Lab (Addiction Psychiatry Clinical Research), Brigham and Women's Hospital, Boston MA

Touch Grass: Exposure to the Outdoors' Benefits on Children from Diverse Backgrounds

Despite the data that time spent outdoors benefits youth in a variety of ways, outdoor education has long been looked down on, leading to program cutbacks and closures. Increasing youth's exposure to the natural world leads to more environmentally conscious and passionate adults. Through qualitative methods such as interview and non-participant observation at Waterford Country School, this study aims to contribute new data about the benefits children from diverse backgrounds experience from increased exposure to the outdoors.

Are Limited English Proficiency Patients Receiving Equitable Care in Our Healthcare System?

Language barriers in healthcare pose significant challenges for Limited English Proficiency (LEP) patients, affecting their access to quality care and adherence to treatments. This project investigates the patient care experience of LEP individuals at Lawrence and Memorial Hospital, evaluating the effectiveness of medical interpretation services. Through informal interviews and observations, feedback was gathered from LEP patients regarding interpretation services and overall care. A new Bilingual Volunteer Role was created to support language services. Findings reveal a preference for in-person interpreters and inconsistent use of interpretation tools by healthcare providers. This work will culminate in a presentation to the PFAC.

Global/Local Engagement: Current Bilingual Safety Volunteer at Lawrence + Memorial Hospital in New London, rounding on Spanish-speaking patients since sophomore year.

The Impacts of US Educational Policies on Mexican-American Students

This research examines the impact of U.S. educational policies, focusing on Affirmative Action, on the academic success of U.S.-born Mexican-American students at Connecticut College. It explores how systemic barriers like inadequate resources, standardized testing, and cultural alienation affect their success. Through a sociological and policy-based lens, the study investigates how these policies may contribute to or worsen challenges faced by Mexican American students, especially after Affirmative Action's repeal. Using qualitative and quantitative methods, the research aims to develop equitable educational strategies and provide policy recommendations to benefit underrepresented students in U.S. higher education.

Global/Local Engagement: Throughout the school year, Enrich Mentorship Program at BDJMS improves students' academic, social-emotional, and self-regulation skills.

Empowering Identity: The POCA Spring 2025 Fashion Show and Community Celebration

This study examines the execution of the 4th Annual POCA Spring 2025 Fashion Show to explore the significance of fashion as a tool for fostering community among students of color at small liberal arts colleges. This study demonstrates how fashion shows create spaces for marginalized communities of color to assert themselves, challenge traditional norms, and build solidarity. Survey data will be collected to evaluate the show's success in achieving its community-building goals. This project emphasizes how fashion is a means of creating meaningful social engagement and offering platforms for underrepresented voices to be seen and heard.

Reclaiming Childhood: Mitigating The Effects of Premature Screen Use with Arts Education

The rise in screen use among children has sparked concerns about its impact on classroom behavior and social-emotional skills. Teachers are quitting at alarming rates due to unprecedented behaviors linked to premature screen use. Research demonstrates the detrimental effects of prolonged screen time on developing brains due to their addictive nature. I propose that arts-based education can offset these effects, as it helps children develop life skills, conceptualize complex feelings, and build community. I will compare the effects of screen time and arts education on development to develop strategies to mitigate related behaviors and advocate for arts funding.

Who Picks Up the Slack?

This project asks how women have advocated for themselves and created networks of mutual aid considering inadequate, gendered, and often non-existent welfare systems. I will begin with the history of

the 20th-century American welfare state and the exclusions and assumptions about gender and the family built into it. I will then examine examples of women-led groups, from the early 20th-century labor movement to the movements that emerged from Second-Wave Feminism and the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s, culminating in a primary-source-based study of one organization and the lessons it offers us today.

Reforming College Admissions: Improving Admissions Outcomes in Major Cities

In the United States, educational outcomes are dramatically influenced by disparities in funding, opportunities, and resources in major cities. Students in underserved urban areas often face lower academic achievement due to overcrowded schools, economic inequality, and limited access to quality teachers and educational materials. This study focuses on the inequities prevalent in school systems within central cities and their substantial impacts on higher education outcomes. Attention is given to the disparities that exist within college admissions when reviewing students from underserved schools or regions, both at the moment of application and in assessing academic achievement in these contexts.

Plight of the Negro: Higher Education

Black people as a whole have the lowest 6-year graduation rate out of any race and black men specifically have the lowest 6-year graduation rate amongst all demographics in college. After examining his personal issues with higher education in his film "Deficit", Ian Hopkins seeks to better understand these struggles as symptoms of a national problem among black students. The film interviews black people of various educational backgrounds from graduate students, dropouts, returning students, and those who opted to avoid college to shed light on the personal stories behind the national problem.

Global/Local Engagement: Interviews with people locally and all over the country.

Effects of Asian American Invisibility in the U.S. Education System

This research argues that institutionalized Asian American (AA) erasure within the United States education system contributes to systemic racism, affecting both identity formation and educational equity for individuals of Asian descent. Using a mixed-methods approach, this research will combine quantitative content analysis of textbooks to evaluate the representation of AA history, along with a confidential survey to gather insights from educators and students about the teaching of AA history at Connecticut College. The overall aim of this study is to combat AA erasure by integrating AA history and contributions into the K-12 curriculum.

Global/Local Engagement: Make Us Visible is a non-profit organization where I participated in an online fellowship for over a year.

The Intersection of Sleep, Culture, and Health

This study investigates the physiological effects of sleep patterns on Hispanic college students, focusing on metrics gathered through the HeartMath app. Hispanic communities face unique health challenges, often driven by stress, sleep deprivation, and mental health concerns. College students, who encounter similar stressors, serve as an ideal population for examining how these factors influence physiological health. Paired with a literature review on the health impacts of sleep disparities in Hispanic populations, this research aims to reveal insights into the links between sleep quality and health, highlighting potential areas for support and intervention in both student and broader Hispanic communities.

Behind the Tips

This study examines tipping and its stigma across time utilizing an intersectional lens. We provide a brief history of tipping, historical patterns of workers who are tipped, and how tipped work is racialized and classed. We will explore two historical case studies, Pullman Porters and flight attendants, to further demonstrate how tipped work has been differentially raced and gendered in the 20th century and connect these histories with current workers (Grubhub, Uber drivers, etc.). The backlash after the pandemic against tipping is read through these histories to understand why there is a highly emotional response to tipping prompts today.

Partnerships for Social Change: A Case Study of the Holleran Center

University-community partnerships are collaborative initiatives between academic institutions and local communities, designed to foster mutual benefits through shared resources and knowledge exchange. This study examines the outcomes of these partnerships, focusing on the dynamic relationship between university students and community partners, as well as the extent to which both groups experience mutual benefits. The research posits that the organizational structure of these partnerships plays a crucial role in their effectiveness. By understanding the mechanisms behind successful partnerships, this research aims to inform more equitable and impactful practices for both universities and their community partners.

Global/Local Engagement: Hearing Youth Voices is a New London student-led nonprofit organization designed to develop students of color into skilled leaders.

Unrecognized Barriers: Narrative Exploration of Mental Healthcare Experiences of Second-Gen Latinos

The inaccessibility of mental health services among ethnic minority populations is often attributed to neatly categorized "cultural" factors or "structural" factors, as is seen in research regarding under-usage of such services among Latino populations. This study seeks to examine the interaction between such phenomena using narrative data from interviews with second generation immigrants of Central and South American heritage, while assessing the local resources that are available to the interviewees. The

findings from this study will provide crucial information for the development of informed and culturally competent services aimed at second generation immigrants.

Global/Local Engagement: I studied in Toledo, Spain for the entirety of the Spring 2024 semester. I studied Spanish and social psychology.

A Look into Mental Health Care Disparities Among Hispanic Populations

Social justice and health inequities have traditionally been addressed by focusing on increasing access to resources. This often overlooks the deeper issue that the systems and services are not sufficiently diverse to meet the unique needs of different populations. The gap in culturally competent care has led to significant disparities in treatment outcomes for Hispanic communities. Mental health services frequently fail due to a lack of cultural competence, diversity, system flexibility to meet needs. This study aims to explore how enhancing diversity and cultural awareness can create a more effective and inclusive mental health care.

Global/Local Engagement: I have worked with New London organizations addressing health, education, and career inequities over several semesters during my time here.

How Does Media Affect Mental Health?

To understand the current state of mental health in the Western World we must consider an often-overlooked factor: media consumption. Today's generations are exposed to various media from infancy, yet our understanding of its impact on mental health remains in its early stages. In my presentation, I will draw on my professional experience, which provides insights into the decision-making processes behind media production, and connect these insights with my academic studies in psychology. This will allow me to offer a personal perspective on the significant relationship between media consumption and mental well-being.

Leveraging Social Media: How Politicians Engage and Connect with Younger Generations

In today's tech-driven world, politicians globally use social media to promote themselves, their campaigns, and missions, especially to younger generations. Majority of Generation Z, born between 1997 and 2012, is now eligible to vote, making social media crucial in reaching them. During the summer of 2024, I worked as a Communications intern for both the Mayor of Honolulu and Pineapple Tweed, a PR agency, producing media content for both. Drawing on these experiences, I aim to explore how politicians effectively engage younger voters through social media, using this project to examine the strategies and impact of these efforts.

While versatile and integral to paper conservation, WSP can potentially bar aspiring paper conservators with wheat allergy and celiac disease from entering the field. My project will focus on experimenting with viable alternatives for WSP. A successful alternative will

improve accessibility to the profession for people with these hidden disabilities, or conservators with limited access to WSP itself.

However, in the Middle East, the discourse changed, frustration, fear, and vengeful sentiments emerged, yet the United States refused to listen. This questions valuing the ulterior perspective of the Afghan and Iraqi populations, and if their opinion was reflective of the reality of the War on Terror.

Public education was forever changed with the passing of Brown v. Board, mandating national desegregation of public schools. Civil rights activists believed that if their children had access to the better funded white schools, their children would succeed academically. Despite this hope, activists and the federal government failed to consider the consequences of residential segregation on schooling. The federal government attempted to withhold funding if schools did not desegregate, creating policies that further alienated Black students, retroactively attempting to fix this. In my presentation, I aim to present how white supremacy persisted through education structures in the years following Brown.

Building Trust and Health Equity: Addressing COVID19 Vaccine Uptake in Latine Communities

This project explores how practices such as culturally tailored communication, trusted messengers, and language-specific translations can combat COVID-19 vaccine hesitancy and improve vaccine uptake in Latine communities. By leveraging factors including evidence-based messaging and understanding the impact of historical trauma, my proposal seeks to rebuild trust and promote equitable healthcare. Insights from public health, statistics, and real-world experiences will guide the proposal and the issue of vaccine disparities. Addressing these topics is vital for promoting equitable health access and reducing systemic disparities affecting Latine populations.

Global/Local Engagement: Brown University, Summer 2023: Analyzed health survey data on dementia in immigrant patients with limited English proficiency.

Trauma and Its Effects on the Well-being of Pediatric Populations

Trauma can impact people in any walk of life; yet, trauma often occurs in children and is passed down intergenerationally. Previous research studies have found that adverse childhood experiences and intergenerational trauma are often catalysts for childhood trauma. If trauma is not dealt with at a young age, it can be passed on for generations and cause detrimental issues to well-being. There is a current need for trauma-centered policies in pediatrician's offices and empathy-building programs in schools to mitigate the effects that intergenerational trauma has on the well-being of children, especially those facing health disparities.

Global/Local Engagement: AVREQ centre for the afterlife of violence and the reparative quest for intergenerational trauma in Stellenbosch, South Africa July 2023

Addressing Eating Disorders in NCAA Women's Distance Running

Despite nearly half of NCAA female distance runners screening positive for eating disorder risk (Krebs et al., 2019), the NCAA does not currently have a standardized protocol for the prevention and treatment of eating disorders. This leaves many athletes and coaches to deal with the issue on their own, risking the deterioration of life-threatening symptoms. To address this, I used research-based evidence to develop NCAA-wide policies to protect the health of female athletes.

Global/Local Engagement: Worked as a Research Assistant in the ASH Lab this past summer. Assisted with experiments and inputting data into spreadsheets.

Addressing Key Challenges with Tuberculosis and Enhancing Prevention Strategies in South Africa

South Africa remains one of the most populated countries with its citizens affected by tuberculosis. Significant strides have been taken since 2010 to mitigate the crisis worldwide. However, tuberculosis is an airborne infection, caused by the bacteria Mycobacterium tuberculosis in the lungs. This project will examine the prevalence of tuberculosis in South Africa and the challenges surrounding obtaining care. Further, I will analyze prevention approaches and re-evaluate policies and programs that can reduce tuberculosis in South Africa. Patients should receive a booster 15 years after receiving the initial TB vaccination.

Global/Local Engagement: Studied Public Health at Stellenbosch University, South Africa. Summer 2023. Focused on infectious, communicable diseases, HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis

Impacts of Community Based Comprehensive Sex Education on LGBTQ Adolescents' Wellbeing

Sex Education is compulsory in 30 states and D.C., while HIV/AIDS prevention is required in 39; however, in many places in the U.S. it is far from comprehensive (WHO, 2023). Sex and relationship education (SRE) is proven to prevent the spread of STIs and reduce sexual assault. SRE becomes more complex in the context of LGBTQ adolescents due to support and resources often lacking. Bans on sex education and anti-LGBTQ legislation pose additional challenges in providing necessary material. This project aims to evaluate and enhance community based SRE as a means of supporting LGBTQ-identifying adolescents.

Global/Local Engagement: Amsterdam, The Netherlands: working as an Intern for an online, community based sex education learning platform, from April-May.

Mental Health Literacy for Elementary Students

About 1 in 6 school-aged children will have symptoms that can lead to a diagnosis of a childhood mental disorder. The transition from elementary school to middle school poses many difficult challenges for a child. Adolescence is marked as a time of immense change both physically and psychologically. Many students report that during middle school their mental health struggles either begin or worsen. In this project, I propose an integrative evidence-based national curriculum in response to the salient challenges of this transition phase.

Effects of Kindness on Mental Health in Young Neurodiverse Populations

Prosocial behaviors benefit both the giver and receiver of kindness, but to what extent? After an evidence-based literature review on this question, I propose a program to reduce stigma towards young neurodivergent populations in elementary education through interactive activities. The program's strengths are the integration of kindness through multiple contexts of students' lives. A limit may be children's short attention spans and that each grade has different conceptualizations of kindness. Learning about this topic applies to my future career in clinical psychology by seeing the relationship between a kind environment and mental health in kids.

Enhancing Injury Prevention: Integrating Physical Therapy into College Athletics to Reduce Injuries

In college athletics, the prevalence of sports-related injuries can be a significant concern for athletes, coaches, and healthcare professionals. This project explores the role of physical therapy measures in injury prevention. Current barriers to implementation within college sports will be examined, such as limited access to physical therapy resources and insufficient funding. Ultimately, this presentation aims to assess ways to effectively embed physical therapy measures into the culture of college athletics, thereby reducing injury rates and promoting the long-term health and performance of student-athletes.

Improving Beach Water Quality Communication

Unsafe beach water quality is becoming a prevalent issue and research has shown that current communication techniques are largely ineffective. My project investigates more meaningful forms of public health communication at publicly-regulated beaches. I am proposing a 3-phase initiative to enhance communication style and allow bathers to make informed decisions. "Phase 1 - Signage" involves distribution of color-coded and direct signage. "Phase 2 - Consistency" utilizes forecasting to allow for daily water quality updates. "Phase 3 - Education" emphasizes water quality education for beach officials. In the future, I intend to pursue a Master of Public Health.

Global/Local Engagement: Collecting weekly water samples through the summer, delivering them to the laboratory for quality testing with the Westchester Health Department.

Democratizing Physical Therapy Care Due to Varying Accessibility Based on Insurance Coverage

Every day people get injured and need care and strengthening to return to a pain-free life. Physical therapy (PT) is a growing needed field to promote healthcare and safety. However, access and care vary based on PT practices, specialization, and cost of care. PT care is not democratized and while accessibility varies based on patients' insurance, so does care. Our goal is to empower individuals with disabilities by ensuring they have access to safe, affordable housing options that meet their unique requirements.

Veterans and the Opioid Crisis: Curbing Addiction Clinically

The opioid epidemic in the United States is out of control. Since the early 1990's, overdoses have claimed over 1 million lives, especially affecting populations who are more predisposed to addiction. One of these populations includes Veterans, due to PTSD and lack of support during military to civilian transitioning. Since veterans have access to free care at VA hospitals around the country, the clinicians they see play a crucial role in their overall wellbeing. Taking into consideration that opioid addiction often begins with a prescription, doctors can serve as a gateway between addiction and healthy opioid usage.

Traumatic Brain Injuries in Pediatrics: Prevalence, Impact and Occupational Therapy Access

Traumatic Brain Injuries (TBIs) are a major cause of long-term disability in children, affecting their cognitive, physical, and emotional development. This project explores the prevalence of pediatric TBIs and disparities in access to ongoing care. Occupational Therapy (OT) plays a key role in recovery by providing personalized interventions to restore skills and foster independence. I propose a hybrid model using telehealth, in-person therapy, and community programs to ensure early assessment, family involvement, and school support. This model addresses barriers to OT access, aiming to improve care for underserved populations and reduce long-term disability in children with TBIs.

Improving Accessibility on College Campuses

My experience as a camp counselor for individuals with neuromuscular disorders sparked my interest in the accessibility of architectural environments. The campgrounds we utilized were meticulously designed to accommodate individuals with mobility challenges. Upon returning to Conn, I noticed a stark contrast in accessibility. This observation prompted me to investigate the criteria used to assess campus accessibility and identify common issues within collegiate architecture. Collaborating with several students from Conn, talking with campers from camp promise and investigating online literature I developed an integrative approach to tackle issues of varying accessibility in collegiate architecture.

Environmental Pollutants: The Disproportionate Impact of Plastic Manufacturing on Vulnerable Communities

The Gulf Coast region has one of the highest concentrations of plastic manufacturing plants in the U.S. These plants are frequently located near public housing, exposing vulnerable communities to toxic air pollutants being released daily. Plastic manufacturing requires the use of petrochemicals that are cancer-causing and/or endocrine disruptors that have negative effects on human health. The Clean Air Act was created to protect people and the environment from air pollution. However, it fails to protect the most vulnerable populations. Using education to inform future generations about these risks and inequities, teaches students to make informed voting decisions.

Disparities in Mental Health Outcomes of Students in Small Liberal Arts Colleges

This project explores disparities in mental health care access and outcomes among diverse populations in small liberal arts colleges in the US. Despite advancements in mental health awareness, significant inequalities persist, influenced by factors such as socioeconomic status, race, ethnicity, gender, and geographic location. Through a mixed-methods approach, including quantitative analysis of healthcare utilization data on college campuses and qualitative literature review, this study aims to identify key barriers to mental health care. Findings highlight the urgent need for targeted interventions to improve accessibility, enhance provider training, and promote policy reforms on college campuses.

Global/Local Engagement: I am interning at Shared Harvest. The specific project I am working on surrounds the mental health of healthcare workers.

Assessing Language Disparities in US Emergency Room Care

This project discusses the issues that non-English speakers face in healthcare. This project specifically discusses the significant decrease in level of care received in emergency rooms across the United States, and will look at solutions to how this level of care can be increased.

Designing Effective HIV Prevention: Lessons from Connecticut and the Western Cape

This study synthesizes HIV preventative education strategies from Connecticut and the Western Cape Region, South Africa, for application in small cities. It compares HIV prevalence, diagnostic factors, and global preventive measures. It evaluates the effectiveness of current approaches, identifies gaps, and proposes an innovative intervention for New London, CT, integrating multidisciplinary content. The aim is to enhance HIV prevention by leveraging successful strategies from both regions.

Global/Local Engagement: Study abroad in South Africa and visiting Alliance for Living (CT) to understand the relationship between HIV and public health.

Reducing Health Disparities: Improving Infectious Disease Care Access for Black Americans

This project focuses on improving access to preventative care and treatment for infectious diseases, particularly HIV/AIDS, in Black American populations. By addressing systemic barriers, such as structural racism and health inequities in urban healthcare settings, the project seeks to reduce health disparities and improve outcomes for vulnerable communities. Drawing from bioethics, historical analysis, and practical experience from a research internship, the project will explore strategies for healthcare systems to enhance access to care. Emphasizing evidence-based recommendations, the study aims to develop interventions that promote equity in healthcare access prevention and align with broader public health goals.

Stress Contagion in Small Liberal Arts College Communities

Stress contagion is the collective phenomenon where stress from one individual is transferred over to someone else through social interaction. Stress is an extremely present public health issue among and negatively impacts the mental health of college students, and contributes to academic burnout. In small college, students are in extremely close vicinity to one another and may be experiencing stress contagion in the classroom or other common areas. Consequently, colleges need to offer stress management resources for students.

Global/Local Engagement: My local engagement that I will be using is an internship at the Emotion, Health, and Psychophysiology Lab at Yale.

Loneliness and Social Connection in Housing-Insecure Women

This project targets loneliness and social exclusion as risk factors for housing-insecure women. Research conducted revealed that this population is at higher risk for insufficient social connection and networks. This project proposes a model to foster effective social networks and connections between housing-insecure women. This community-centric approach focuses on building upon urgent needs to create a basis for connection. Strengths of this approach include the integration of mental and physical care, while limitations include lack of funding. I plan to build upon this work through work in the New London and Boston communities.

Global/Local Engagement: Internship at Women's Lunch Place, daytime shelter for unhoused women in Boston, Summer 2024

Socioeconomic Barriers in Melanoma Care: Disparities in Detection and Treatment

Dermatology is perceived as a luxurious branch of healthcare, often facing accessibility issues for those of lower socioeconomic status. Many view dermatological care as non-essential, despite its crucial role in health. While individuals with fair skin are over 20 times more likely to be diagnosed with melanoma, their survival rates remain the highest. Black individuals have the poorest melanoma survival rates and are typically diagnosed later. These disparities reveal that lower-income populations are more likely to experience adverse health outcomes due to delayed screenings, financial stress, and limited health literacy, emphasizing the significance of this public health issue.

Global/Local Engagement: Transition Academy, Groton (freshman-senior year): Build relationships with college-aged students with disabilities.

Toxins in the Nervous System: Minorities are Suffering

Lead is a naturally occurring metal, a neurotoxin, that alters the function of the nervous system. Lead has been used in paint, toys, and in pipes. It is lead in drinking water that this project will be focused on. There are no safe levels of lead within the bloodstream, as acute exposure involves cognitive and emotional changes while chronic exposure involves neurodegeneration. Populations that are suffering are children and minority communities; children are more vulnerable to the effects of lead due to their developing nervous system while minority communities are not receiving proper education surrounding this issue.

Global/Local Engagement: Summer of 2023-2024 I have volunteered at Mount Sinai Hospitals Delirium Program, providing non-medical interventions to geriatric patients.

Medical Tourism: Supporting International Patients at Boston Children's Hospital

From my internship working closely with Boston Children's Hospital, I wanted to focus on the resources available for international pediatric patients and their families to make their transition to the US healthcare system as seamless as possible. My clinical and administrative experiences revealed that some families were dissatisfied with their child's care, often due to cultural differences and different expectations of healthcare. For my project, I explored ways to enhance the quality of care for this population, including developing a specialized hospital orientation program tailored to each patient's cultural background, including their native country, religion, and language.

Redlining's Effects on Birth Outcomes

The Black American community endures a disproportionate rate of poor birth outcomes, such as preterm birth and maternal mortality. This project focuses on how redlining, an institutionally racist practice that denied neighborhoods of color from purchasing mortgage loans in the 1930s, has contributed to such disparities. Potential strategies to address this public health issue are also discussed.

Global/Local Engagement: Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center Internship, Summer 2023, observed two births, one of which dealing placental abruption, a pregnancy complication

Synthetic Chemistry as a Means of Drug Discovery and Optimization

Development of medicines, vaccines, and drugs that can better public health, such as the COVID-19 vaccine, is a multistep process. Drug discovery often starts with total synthesis of a naturally occurring biologically active compound that can later be optimized by medicinal chemists. I am working directly on one such total synthesis of natural product Guanacastepene A, a compound that shows activity against antibiotic resistant Gram positive bacteria. A completed total synthesis could allow researchers to effectively synthesize Guanacastepene A in the laboratory, allowing for detailed assessment of its drug candidacy and optimization by medicinal chemistry.

Global/Local Engagement: Research on campus in organic chemistry in the Ovaska chemistry lab.

Exploring the Behavioral Impact of Traumatic Brain Injuries.

The potential link between traumatic brain injuries (TBIs) and changes in behavior, particularly regarding violent crimes, presents a significant public health concern. The widespread prevalence of TBIs means that anyone can experience head trauma, making it crucial to understand how these injuries might influence behavioral outcomes like increased aggression or impulsivity. Understanding this connection can aid in developing targeted prevention and intervention strategies, improving community safety and guiding policy decisions. Effective management of TBIs requires integrating mental health support with physical recovery. Raising awareness about these risks can reduce stigma and foster better support systems for affected individuals.

Global/Local Engagement: Pathology Research Intern at Yale University School of Medicine beginning in June 2024 conducting research on traumatic brain injuries.

Applying Artificial Intelligence in Healthcare

Artificial intelligence (AI) is a powerful tool that has gained much attention in recent years. Increasing numbers of individuals are utilizing AI to automate processes and make their lives easier. This presentation addresses current and potential future applications of AI in healthcare and how such technologies can be

Preventing Heat Stroke Death in High School Sports

Heat Stroke is a well-researched condition with known effective treatments. Despite this knowledge, people die every year in athletic and occupational settings due to a lack of proper policies and regulations. This project explores how current policy and treatment plans can be influenced by current scientific literature to end preventable deaths from heat stroke.

Global/Local Engagement: This summer I volunteered at the Korey Stringer Institute at Uconn where I helped conduct research on heat stroke prevention.

The Impact of HIV on the Neurological Status of Patients

Globally, about 40 million people have Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). As the life expectancy of people living with HIV has increased, other comorbid medical complications have emerged. HIV infection, especially untreated, can cause HIV-associated neurological disorders such as minor neurocognitive disorder, HIV-associated dementia, and Alzheimer's-like pathology. Current prevention plans addressing HIV and dementia are investigated in this project, and novel suggestions to address HIV's impact on the neurological status of patients are explored.

Global/Local Engagement: Summer internship as research assistant at Center for Translational and Cognitive Neuroscience at the VA Hospital in Jamaica Plain, MA.

Impact of HIV-Literacy on Treatment Adherence in HIV+ Adults

Project reviews impact of previous HIV-literacy improvement programs on treatment adherence in HIV+ adults; and from these findings, designs a holistic HIV-education program to improve HIV-related outcomes. Previous research found that individuals with differing levels of HIV-literacy may benefit from different interventions: one study found a pictographic intervention was the best treatment for moderate HIV-literacy individuals and another found an online platform was the best intervention for individuals with inadequate HIV-literacy. Therefore, a holistic intervention should incorporate both a pictographic component and an online educational program for moderate and inadequate HIV-literacy individuals respectively.

Global/Local Engagement: EMT Class at Hartford Hospital (Summer '24) - specific focus on ride time and clinic hours

Autonomic Nervous System Training for First Responders

Current training for first responders lacks mental health and stress management education, leading to difficulty de-escalating emergency situations and the development of mental health conditions. This project proposes a new training model for first responders that contains information on the autonomic nervous system. The autonomic nervous system controls involuntary body processes and is responsible for the body's stress response. First responders can benefit from learning how to regulate the autonomic nervous system to de-escalate stressful situations, improve mental health, and provide better care to patients and members of the community.

Making Affordable Childcare Accessible for Everyone

This internship explored early childhood literacy and affordable childcare's significance. In collaboration with the finance department, it analyzed childcare costs and grant acquisition. The experience emphasized connection, inclusion, and the crucial 0-6 age range for child development. A strong educational foundation offers low-income families and children of color a better chance for positive learning experiences. Through a liberal arts education model, this multidimensional internship highlighted the value of learning about education, nonprofits, and finance.

A Comparative Look at Medical Access in the U.K. vs. America

Access to medical care should be a right, not a privilege. However, this is not the case. During my study abroad experience, I expected the U.K.'s Universal Healthcare System to lack these shortcomings, but these challenges only took different forms. Lake Superior to James Bay: Canoe Tripping as Sustainable Urban Design

This research project examines how traditional Canadian canoe tripping principles apply to contemporary urban design and the construction of sustainable cities. It takes an interdisciplinary approach, incorporating indigenous history, ecology, environmental justice, resource management, and wilderness navigation. This study is realized through leading a month-long canoe trip on the Missinaibi River in northern Ontario. The next phase is an independent study coordinated with the Architectural Studies department to analyze research findings through the urban planning lens. This project aims to reimagine sustainable design from a basis in indigenous Canadian land stewardship for an environmentally and socially just urban future.

Issues of power within the carceral system as a whole will be discussed regarding both currently and formerly incarcerated individuals.

Breaking Barriers: Accessibility in Higher Education Architecture

A study on how accessible colleges are based on guidelines formulated by individuals diagnosed with disabilities requiring a motorized wheelchair at all times. The study considers changes for schools as well as current successes. Interviews were conducted on individuals with neuromuscular disorders, how they pick schools and anecdotes of their experiences in high school or college. My study looked to consider a health and social justice lens and see how Conn, among other campuses, accommodates those with mobility deficits—by compiling research, lived experiences, and investigative data, an analysis of disabled accommodations in terms of current college architecture and structure.

Contemporary Complexities: The Role of Nostalgia in Shaping Collective Memory

Space and Shelter: How Spatial Architecture Impacts Wellbeing and Homelessness
